Step 2

What is the Cigna Dental Oral Health Integration Program?

It's a program that reimburses out-of-pocket costs for specific dental services used to treat gum disease and tooth decay. The program is for people with certain medical conditions that have been found to be associated with gum disease. There's no additional cost for the program – if you qualify, you get reimbursed!*

Do I qualify?

If you have a Cigna dental plan, you're eligible for the program. You do NOT have to be enrolled in a Cigna medical plan to be eligible for this program. You must currently be under treatment by a doctor for any of the following conditions:

- Heart disease
- Stroke
- Diabetes
- Maternity
- Chronic kidney disease
- Organ transplants
- Head and neck cancer radiation

How does it work?

In order to receive benefits through this program, you must first enroll to participate. Once you've registered, you visit your dentist and pay your usual copay or coinsurance amount. If you visit a Cigna network dentist, they will send us a claim. If you choose to see a dentist not in the Cigna network, you may need to submit the claim yourself. We review the claim and will refund your copay or coinsurance for eligible dental services. Once we receive your claim, you can expect to be reimbursed in about 30 days.

What else does the Oral Health Integration Program include?

You can ask us for information on issues that affect your oral health and your overall wellness – such as fear of going to the dentist. Or the impact of stress or tobacco products. We'll also give you guidance on how to overcome these behaviors.

How do I enroll and use the program?

- 1. Fill out the online registration form found on **myCigna.com**. You can also download a fillable form from Cigna.com or call the number on the back of your ID card to have an enrollment form sent to you. You only need to complete the form one time per qualifying condition.
- 2. Visit your dentist and pay your usual out-of-pocket cost for the covered service. Once we have received your claim, we will send your reimbursement.

What dental services are covered under the Cigna Dental Oral Health Integration Program?

You can get cancer anywhere in your body. Even in your mouth and throat. Most people who get oral cancer are over 40 years old and smoke or chew tobacco.* But oral cancer can strike at any age - whether you use tobacco or not.

More facts about mouth and throat cancer*

- More than 45,000 people in the U.S. are diagnosed each year
- Nearly 9,000 people in the U.S. die from these diseases each year
- About 57% of those diagnosed survive more than five years

Open up. It's good for your health.

Oral cancer screening is part of your regular dental check up. Your dentist will look for suspicious spots and feel for lumps in and around your mouth. This may include the roof of your mouth, inside your cheeks, under your tongue and other areas of the head and neck.

Take a closer look

The most common sign of oral cancer is a flat, painless white or red spot or a small sore that does not heal within 14 days. In many cases, having a spot or sore in your mouth is harmless. But it's important that you tell your dentist so that he/she can decide if further investigation is needed.

Some dentists are using a newer, simple technique to help detect cancerous or precancerous cells, in which the dentist uses a small brush to gather cell samples of a suspicious area. The specimen is then sent to a laboratory for analysis. This oral brush biopsy procedure is easy and can be done in the dentist's chair with very little or no pain. The results may help determine your need for a surgical biopsy or other follow-up.*

Spotting potential signs and/or symptoms of oral cancer*

Look for signs:

- Red or white patch
- > Sore that bleeds easily or does not heal
- Thick or hard spot or a lump
- Roughened or crusted area

Symptoms of oral cancer may include:

- Numbness
- Pain
- Tenderness
- A change in the way your teeth fit together when you bite down

Tell your dentist if you have any problems chewing, swallowing, speaking or moving your tongue or jaw.

Routine preventive care can help to find and treat cancers of the mouth and throat. Visit your dentist regularly for cleanings and exams. And see your dentist immediately if you have any symptoms that worry you.
